

SETTLEMENT & INTEGRATION PROGRAM



Inspiring Belonging Among Newcomers

Settlement services are the path to a better life in Canada for newcomers. Our newcomer information support workers provide new immigrants and refugees with free and multilingual information and support so they can build the life they want in Canada. Newcomers trust our services to positively impact all aspects of their life from employment to housing to finances. We empower newcomers to feel connected and find belonging in their new home.



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GUIDED PATHWAYS COACHING

125 NEWCOMERS SUPPORTED THROUGH CASE MANAGEMENT

Our Guided Pathways coaching, in Punjabi, Arabic and English, provides in-depth support to guide newcomers through the settlement process. Our coaches work with newcomers over many sessions to create an action plan that helps them integrate into Canadian society.

HEALTH PATHWAYS PROGRAM

42 NEWCOMERS HELPED

79 NEWCOMERS AT 8 WORKSHOPS

This new program, with support from Roots Community Health Centre, provides case management and workshops for clients with complex health needs to learn about supports available, access community resources and navigate the health care system.

CANADA LEARNING BOND PROGRAM

28 ONE-TO-ONE SESSIONS

PARENTS AT 10 WORKSHOPS

DIVERSEcity connects newcomer parents to the Canada Learning Bond, free money (up to \$2,000) for low-income families. Through individual sessions and workshops, we guide them in starting an RESP account to save for their child's post-secondary education with an initial \$500 government grant.

<u>DIVERSEstory</u>

Reaching New Horizons

Settling in a new country comes with a lot of questions. Newcomers need information and support to establish themselves and find where they belong.

Take the story of Jini*. After receiving her permanent residence in July 2019, she was excited, but anxious about her new life in Canada. "After the initial excitement wore off, I began to panic. I was like a fish out of water. So, I decided to go out and try to learn as much about Canadian culture."

Her newcomer information support worker, Ann*, was her first point of interaction in Canada. "Ann planted the seed in me about keeping an open mind in terms of career change and charted

out an action plan for me. She explained to me the importance of volunteering as an important tool to gain Canadian experience. And she shared her own beautiful journey in Canada with me."

In her country of origin, Jini was an assistant professor of English literature and language. "Keeping this in mind, my settlement worker introduced me to the world of ESL instructors," she says. "Today, I am a LINC workplace facilitator at Douglas College. If Ann wouldn't have supported and opened my horizons with her excellent advice, I wouldn't have gotten back into my career in Canada."

"Jini was optimistic about her future in Canada, had a strong teaching

background and excellent communication

skills," says Ann. "The only complicating factor was her lack of knowledge about resources in the community and how to utilize them. Now she seems clear about her long-term goals and has even decided to enrol in the career development practitioner program to reach her next career goal of helping newcomers like her."

According to Jini, "I want to give back the help and encouragement I received in my initial years in Canada." • * Names changed for privacy.





CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS



Steps to Help Children and Parents Thrive

Adapting to a new country can be every bit as challenging for children. Our **Children's Programs** are designed to help them and their whole families thrive in Canada. Through our two signature programs, First Steps Early Years Refugee Program and Multicultural Outreach Program, we support refugee and immigrant families with children under the age of 12 years old with child development, parenting education, outreach support, accessing community resources and building social networks with other families.



FIRST STEPS EARLY YEARS PROGRAM 276 DROP-IN SESSIONS 159 MIDDLE YEARS ACTIVITIES

First Steps, jointly managed by DIVERSEcity, Options Community Services and Umoja Operation Compassion Society, supports newly arrived refugee children (up to five years old) through play-based early childhood education to help them, and their parents, thrive. Activities include:

- Family drop-in program
- Middle years activities
- Cooking Together sessions
- Singing Together music therapy
- Kindergarten readiness program
- Parenting workshops
- Women's support sessions
- English conversation circles
- Home and integration visits
- Photo shoots (see photo above)



MULTICULTURAL OUTREACH PROGRAM

173 FAMILIES SUPPORTED



Our multicultural early childhood education outreach workers help immigrant and refugee families with children from birth to six years old connect to their community and support them as they access resources such as:

- Family resource programs

- Food banks
- Settlement programs

First Steps for Families

For moms new to Canada, parenting can be an isolating experience. Dealing with language barriers, lack of information and a limited support network can be frustrating when raising young kids. DIVERSEcity's Children's Programs are an important stepping stone for these families.

Take the story of Mariam,* a refugee mother from Eritrea, a growing source country for clients. Knowing no one and with limited English, she says it was difficult for her and her family to meet people and make friends. "I didn't know where to go for things or [how to structure] my daily routine. One day I went to the library and the librarian told me about the First Steps program and I went there the next day!" she says. "My children and I were very excited to come to First Steps drop-in class twice a week. The staff welcomed us and set us up nicely with quality crafts, painting, toys and books. For me, talking with other moms and trying different things gave me more confidence."

Aisha*, a mother from Iraq, couldn't agree more. "First Steps is a great program. I learned many things that have benefited me in my life. I wish my voice reaches all new refugees with children who live in Surrey to tell them to reach out to the First Steps program."

YOUTH PROGRAMS



Guiding Diverse Youth to a Better Future

About 60 per cent of the newcomer population in Surrey are youth aged 13–24, so it came as no surprise that our **Youth Programs** saw rapid growth last year. Delivering settlement and integration support services, we help immigrant, refugee and other racialized youth in their Canadian and personal journeys.

DIVERSE*youth*, formerly known as the Youth Integration Program (YIP), provides learning and enrichment opportunities through a variety of workshops and training series in English for newcomer and refugee youth aged 13–18 and 19–24. Our focus is on building community connections, confidence and self-esteem among youth, all while developing transferrable skills in areas such as communication, leadership, employment readiness, educational support and recreation.

The RISE Youth program has its foundations in the broader Refugee and Immigrant Specialized Experience (RISE) program, offering case management for youth aged 13–24, who may be experiencing multiple challenges in settling into their new community. RISE Youth helps newcomer youth increase their capacity to cope with the barriers they are facing, and to increase their skills and knowledge to settle into their new home, school and community. Youth are supported with both one-to-one support, in their first languages such as Arabic, Dari, French, Karen and Kirundi, as well as field trips and group-based workshops, including our Healthy Self, Healthy Families workshops.

Community Connections Field Trips

Field trips are a great way for youth to have fun and make connections while also learning about their community and the history and culture of Canada. In all, **41 youth** from the DIVERSE*youth* program and **28 youth** from RISE Youth attended five field trips each to local spots such as:

Empowering Youth, Eh!

Eh Pu Paw, 19, is new to Canada with limited English, and was facing all manner of culture shock. "She had been struggling to study to study at high school in Surrey due to her language barrier and lack of confidence," says her RISE Youth case specialist, Saw Joe. "She had a hard time studying and making friends at school even though she said she loved school and wanted to improve her English and meet other people." Being part of the RISE Youth program helped her adjust to her new life. "By attending information and orientation workshops through RISE Youth, I have learned about education, government benefits, health care, rights and responsibility and more," says Eh. "The workshops helped me to understand more about Canada. I also learned about stress management and self-care. We played games and had fun activities during the sessions, as well as field trips. I saw new things, made friends and had fun."

"By providing empowerment and supports to Eh Pu Paw through RISE Youth programming such as one-to-one services, group workshops and field trips, she has gained more self-esteem, replying to the questions and expressing her point of view either in the Karen language or even in English," says Saw Joe. •

SENIORS' SERVICES



Empowering Seniors to Live Full Lives

elping seniors live with independence, wellness and connection is at the heart of DIVERSEcity's **Seniors' Services**. Our services have also expanded rapidly over the last year to meet the community's growing needs as community members enter their golden years.



Through our Better At Home contactors and volunteers, we provide non-medical services to help seniors stay in their homes for longer. From friendly visits to grocery shopping to housekeeping and yardwork, Better at Home, a United Way program, truly became an essential service for seniors at risk of isolation when the COVID-19 pandemic hit in March 2020.

ACTIVE AGING: STAYING ACTIVE SENIORS SOCIAL CLUB



28 WORKSHOPS



This specialized program, in partnership with the City of Surrey, supports a dynamic group of Punjabi-speaking senior women to get healthy, happy and connected with regular exercise classes, yoga, workshops, community kitchens and field trips.



SPECIALIZED SENIORS' SERVICES

In early 2020, DIVERSEcity introduced two new specialized services for immigrant seniors with higher needs. The Newcomer Family and Friends Caregiver Support Program provides support to immigrant caregivers of high-need seniors aged 55+, while the Therapeutic Activation Program for Immigrant and Refugee Seniors (TAPIRS) offers broad support services, wellness activities, exercise classes and more to help vulnerable seniors. A Giddha dance event was held to celebrate the launch of the new specialized seniors' services (see photo on right).

DIVERSEcity is a key partner of the Surrey Seniors Planning Table and supported the community group on its ninth annual Intercultural Showcase, featuring multicultural music, dance and food, to **200+ attendees** at Guildford Recreation Centre.

We also helped with Elderstory: Speaking Out, a project that trained **25** senior volunteers in storytelling facilitation skills and engaged more than **400** children and seniors in **54** storytelling sessions.



COMMUNITY & VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS



Building Connections to the Community

A fter newcomers arrive and start settling into their new country, one of their most important next steps is to build connections within their local community. DIVERSEcity's **Community and Volunteer Programs** help newcomers and other diverse communities — including seniors, refugee claimants, temporary residents and Canadian citizens — become active participants in DIVERSEcity and partner programs, allowing them to feel engaged, supported and connected to others. As a result, we're creating a stronger community for all.

BC SETTLEMENT SERVICES

576 CLIENTS

LANGUAGES SERVED: ENGLISH, KOREAN, SPANISH & PUNJABI

Our BC Settlement Services support clients — including international students (70), refugee claimants (93), temporary foreign workers (166) and naturalized citizens (247) — who typically can't access settlement services due to their immigration status, but who still have many needs during their settlement journey. These provincially funded services help them live, work and connect successfully.

Migrant Worker Workshops

DIVERSEcity was a partner in the Migrant Worker Support Network, led by MOSAIC. Our BC Settlement Services team ran four workshops for **42 clients** that combined a community kitchen session with speakers on topics such as migrant rights and immigrating to Canada.



VOLUNTEER PROGRAM





GROUP VOLUNTEER TRAINING SESSIONS

People volunteer to give back to their community, gain experience and meet new people. Our Volunteer Program helps them do that, training them to work in a broad range of roles at DIVERSEcity, including our Annual Income Tax Clinic. In 2019, our volunteers helped **1,018 clients** at **27 sessions** of our tax clinics.

FOOD SECURITY PROGRAMS









Our hands-on Community Kitchen programs and two Community Gardens in Surrey help local families develop skills to cook, grow, shop and plan for healthy and affordable food.

Our Refugee and Immigrant Specialized Experience (RISE) Program supports refugee and immigrant newcomer families experiencing multiple and complex barriers to settlement. Using a trauma-informed and strength-based approach, we empower clients with one-to-one culturally competent case management in their first language. This includes accompanying clients to appointments, workshops, field trips and helping them access housing, health care, education, government benefits and more.

DIVERSECITY BUNDLE UP CAMPAIGN

117 FAMILIES HELPED





Our DIVERSEcity Bundle Up Campaign helps newly arrived refugee families stay warm during the Canadian winter with donated coats, clothing, toiletries and food staples. This annual donation drive requires more than **100 hours** of planning, setup and distribution, and relies on the support of **20 volunteers** and the sponsorship and support of many partners, including, among others Woodward Hill Elementary, Fraser Wood Elementary, SFU, RBC and Surrey Libraries, where the one-day event is held.

HEALTHY SELF, HEALTHY FAMILY WORKSHOPS



45 SESSIONS

Healthy Self, Healthy Family Workshops focus on mental wellness and coping strategies for newcomers struggling with the settlement process. Facilitated by a family counsellor with language assistance from RISE case specialists, participants learn new skills to help them relieve stress, navigate through trauma, practise self-care and make connections in the community.

TOGETHER NOW LGBTQ+ PEER SUPPORT GROUP 💳



15 SESSIONS

Together Now is a free peer support group for LGBTQ+ immigrants and refugees. It is a safe and welcoming space where participants can meet new people, learn about local resources, access counselling services and be part of an inclusive community. The group also helps in bridging social services to assist members with other settlement-related issues such as housing, income assistance and employment.

<u>DIVERSEstory</u>

Supporting Refugees in Crisis

When the crisis in Syria was brought to the world's attention, Canada welcomed thousands of refugees from the wartorn nation. Solma* arrived in Canada as a Syrian refugee in 2019 with added vulnerabilities as a transgender woman. Back in Syria, Solma had been subjected to targeted violence that left her with severe trauma to her head and arms. Then, once in Canada, she was excluded from her ethnic community because of her sexual orientation.

"To further complicate matters, before Solma was finally able to secure housing, she was living in a shelter, which delayed the arrival of her government assistance. Without this income assistance, she could not afford to make her rent payment and risked losing the safe housing she had," says Ali*, the RISE case specialist, who helped Solma secure emergency funds through the Canadian Council for Refugees' Syrian Refugee Support Fund, administered in part by DIVERSEcity. (DIVERSEcity, in fact, distributed **\$8,000 in emergency funds** to 16 families through the fund, and an **additional \$3,400** to eight families through its own Refugee Support Fund.) Through this fund and the support of her RISE

case specialist who explained the situation to her landlord, Solma was able to make her rent payment, thus preventing her from going back to a precarious living situation. Today, not only does Solma feel relief, but she says she is more confident knowing that she is supported by a community of people willing to help her gain newfound independence and security. • *Names changed for privacy.

EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS



Career Skills and Support for Newcomers and Youth

or newcomers, youth and vulnerable adult communities, finding a job can be a challenge due to language barriers, lack of experience and foreign credential recognition. But a good job is a critical step in building their lives in Canada. DIVERSEcity's free **Employment Programs** help them learn job search techniques, access skills training, get work experience and connect with hiring employers. And for newcomers with entrepreneurial goals, our Immigrant Entrepreneur Program supports them on their journey to launching a business. This year, DIVERSEcity also launched two programs, H.E.A.L. and S.A.H.A.R.A., focused on vulnerable adults who need trauma-informed career and counselling support to find their place in the workforce.

H.E.A.L. FOR WORK PROGRAM

23 PARTICIPANTS C LANGUAGES SERVED: ARABIC, MANDARIN, PUNJABI, SPANISH & SWAHILI

Developed for newcomer survivors of domestic violence or trauma, especially women, the H.E.A.L. (Hope. Employment. Adaptability. Learning) for Work Program offers trauma counselling, short-term certificate training, skills training and work experience for careers in retail, production and manufacturing, and more. We emphasize hope, empowerment, safety and confidence, while providing a support network to enter the labour market.

S.A.H.A.R.A. PROGRAM



The S.A.H.A.R.A. (Subtance Abuse Health and Recovery Awareness) Program serves multi-barriered men, overcoming trauma, depression, criminal records and substance use, who are seeking jobs in warehousing, production and manufacturing, among other sectors. We support them in their job search journey to regain their self-confidence, develop new job and digital literacy skills, and work toward a sustainable career path.

Our innovative youth employment programs — including Future Leaders, Future Troopers and Start it Right! — coached **160 newcomer youth** in 2019–2020 to upgrade their skills, enrol in post-secondary education and gain work experience. With financial assistance, tuition allowances, group workshops and individualized coaching from our six certified employment specialists, DIVERSEcity helps youth create an action plan, setting them up for success and confidence in the Canadian workplace.

BUSINESS PLANS LAUNCHED

Research shows that immigrants are entrepreneurial, but they need help navigating the Canadian business landscape. Our Immigrant Entrepreneur Program, sponsored by TD and supported by BDC, helps them along this journey. Through one-to-one consultation, business training workshops and the DIVERSEcity Entrepreneur and Small Business Fair, we aim to help newcomers plan, launch and grow their own business.

DIVERSEstory

The Cloth Facemask Initiative

A group of immigrant women who first came together through the Make It! Sewing Business Program, delivered jointly by Vancouver Community College and DIVERSEcity's Immigrant Entrepreneur Program, started to sew cloth facemasks to help in the COVID-19 pandemic.

Clara, Wendy, Rosey, Masoomeh, Bekhita, Digna and Shiva are members of the DIVERSEcitysupported sewing business collective called Sewmates Craft.

Florence Kao, an employment specialist with DIVERSEcity's Immigrant Entrepreneur Program, drew on both her professional experience and hobby sewing skills to help launch Sewmates and the broader Intercultural Women's Maker Society. The society today supports women with diverse cultural backgrounds in improving their skills, expanding social networks, and gaining self-confidence and independence through maker-based entrepreneurial activities such as sewing and cooking.

"Empowering immigrant women to become self-employed is a passion of mine," says Florence. "And I couldn't be prouder of this amazing group of women, who come from different cultural backgrounds, for using their sewing skills for the greater good in difficult times."

"With our cultural backgrounds, we understand that wearing masks is a common protection in most Asian countries," says Clara. "We were so worried about the emerging situation and some of our members kept mentioning this idea of sewing masks." Wendy adds: "So we held a motion during our Zoom meeting

to use our skills to donate our time and do something good for the community. We all voted 'Yes' that we should do this!"

Research was done, their individual sewing machines came out, and the women started sewing masks from their homes. The first 100 masks were sewn specifically to help charitable organizations in the Downtown Eastside. After that, the orders started coming in quickly, and the group has worked diligently to meet the growing demand, while also ensuring to make masks for charities dealing with vulnerable communities.

Getting Jobseekers Ready for the Workforce

Diverse in the workforce with the right skillset, information and confidence. The fee-based courses are one to five days in length and are taught by industry experts. Classes are held at DIVERSEcity, offsite facilities and now also virtually. In-person or online, the courses are known for quality training, and participants consistently provide excellent feedback. 


Communication as the First Step to Success

Our Language Training and Literacy Programs offer a range of free English language classes to permanent residents, namely through our Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC) program, from pre-literacy to Canadian Language Benchmark (CLB) 6. For clients who need extra support, we also offer LINC Assistance and Readiness Classes (LARC), plus two Community Adult Literacy Program (CALP) class. Classes are offered throughout the week and include community field trips to give students a chance to practise their language skills in real life. Our English Conversation Circles also help them practise. For those with children, we offer morning childminding with a strong early childhood education curriculum. Both parents and kids graduate from our program with improved English, greater confidence, knowledge about Canada and new connections.

Samahr couldn't speak very much English at all when she first signed up for DIVERSEcity's LINC classes. "Now I can speak better because my teacher, Valda, helps me so much," she says. "I learn speaking, listening, reading and writing and I understand much now. Now I can make phone appointment for doctor and talk to my doctor about my sick. Now I can go anywhere, I help myself and they understand me." From her teacher's perspective,

Valda has seen Samahr blossom

over five months of classes. "At first, she seemed hesitant to engage in speaking in class," says Valda. "I have a practice of getting students to tell the class about their evening; Samahr could barely squeak out two sentences. Now I notice her helping other students to understand the work at hand."

One morning, Samahr came to class very excited to share some news. "She shared with the class how she was able to call DIVERSEcity's front desk and enrol her husband in evening classes," says Valda. "I think that was the day she realized the value of her English classes because it had enabled her to do this real world task unaided. Her excitement was infectious and the whole class was in high spirits the whole day."

Samahr adds: "I don't need someone to say things for me in Arabic now. No translator anymore because my teacher is a good teacher, that is why my English is better." •

Supporting Families

Newcomer husband and wife, Nav and Taj* had four children (aged 13 to 22) and were facing multiple issues such as adjustment to new culture, financial strains, relationship challenges and trauma. With Nav the sole provider, he was under pressure to provide for his large family, leading to family arguments and outbursts. Once, the police were even called. The family was then referred for family counselling at DIVERSEcity.

"We provided emotional support and therapeutic interventions to help the family deal with their traumatic experiences and stressors," says their counsellor, Harry*. "They were helped to understand their emotions and feelings, identify their anger triggers and use self-regulation techniques and stressreduction strategies to manage their emotions."

Sessions with just the married couple focused on their marital relationship, allowing them to explore their relationship dynamics and work on the marital bond. They were able to provide emotional support to each other as well as initiate more respectful communication within their family.

After completing their counselling

sessions and getting additional help through settlement and employment services, this family is thriving at home and in the community. "In a recent follow-up call, they told me that the counselling has been very rewarding for them. They have been more understanding, caring and connected as a family. They make time to communicate with each other openly but respectfully, are managing their stresses and emotions, as well as handling tough family situations in a supportive way," says Harry. • **Names changed for privacy.*


