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The Business Case

Immigrants are ready for business

- with some support!
- Immigrants have the education, skills and risk tolerance to succeed as entrepreneurs. However, they lack information on the local context of doing business. They are also missing established networks and a credit history.
- More and more newcomers arrive in BC every day, yet they still face countless barriers to employment. It's no surprise then that many turn to self-employment arrival, with higher rates than Canadian-born people.
- BIPOC and women entrepreneurs face added barriers in starting their own businesses, including access to funding. Yet they are both growing demographics in self-employment.







What the Statistics Say



251,600

Number of newcomer entrepreneurs in 2018, a 22% increase since 2006 (BDC)



80%

Of Canada's population growth by 2032 will be accounted for by immigrants (BDC)



10.8% vs 7.5%

More immigrants are self-employed than Canadian-born people (Statistics Canada)





It's a Global Trend ...

Studies say ...

A 2012 study by Global Entrepreneurship Monitor found that immigrants were more likely to start businesses than native-born populations in most of the 69 countries surveyed.

Across the border

In the United States, where 13.7 per cent of the population is foreign-born, immigrants represent 20.2 per cent of the self-employed workforce and 25 per cent of startup founders.

Our Diverse Entrepreneurs Business Incubator program supported by TD Bank helps immigrant and BIPOC entrepreneurs to plan, launch and grow their own business

- A 24+ week self-employment training program, networking and support system, and business incubation platform
